

Please read the following important information regarding AP exams for 2021.

**YOU MUST READ THIS ENTIRE DOCUMENT!!**

- SUHS will be administering AP Exams in the first testing window: May 3-14, 2021.
- The College Board AP second testing window will only be utilized for rare circumstances and must be approved by the campus administrator. SUHS will not administer AP exams during the College Board third testing window.
- The 2021 AP paper exams will be offered to all registered students.
- Students are required to follow all COVID-19 safety protocols including the wearing of a facial covering and remaining socially distanced when on campus and participating in the AP exams.

- **Arrive/Check-In Times on Test Day:**
  - **If you are taking an exam that begins at 8:00am, you MUST arrive before 7:30 am for check-in.**
  - **If you are taking an exam that begins at 12:00pm, you MUST arrive before 11:30 am for check-in.**
  - **For all exams, you will need to show your SUHS Student ID upon entering the building.**
  
- All students and parents are required to read the "2021 AP Exam Terms and Conditions" information prior to testing. This information can be found here: [www.cb.org/apexamterms](http://www.cb.org/apexamterms) On exam day, students will need to acknowledge on their answer sheets that they have read and agree to the Terms and Conditions before taking the exam.

- Students cannot independently opt to choose the testing window. The district is responsible for determining which of the AP testing dates and modes are best suited for this school year. SUHS will abide by the College Board's best practice that students complete in-school testing. Students who test using a paper version will maximize his/her opportunity to be successful on the exam. For all paper testing, the directions are read to the students and students can go back to previous questions, as times allows. Digital Exams are very different than the 2020 Emergency plan. The digital exams are full-length AP exams and start/stop automatically. For digital exams, students are not able to go back to questions after they've been answered, or go back and forth between unanswered questions. For these reasons, SUHS will continue to implement best practices for students by completing in-school paper and pencil testing.
  
- **Bring to the Exam Room**
  - Two sharpened No. 2 pencils (with erasers) for completing multiple-choice answer sheets.
  
  - Two pens, with black or dark blue ink only, for completing areas on the exam booklet covers and for free-response questions in most exams.
  
  - A watch (in case the exam room doesn't have a clock that can be easily seen).

Up to two calculators with the necessary capabilities if they are taking an AP Biology, Calculus, or Chemistry Exam. (Students please visit [apstudents.org/courses](http://apstudents.org/courses) and click on the link for their course for the specific calculator policy.)

A ruler or straightedge if taking an AP Physics Exam.

**Do NOT Bring to the Exam Room\***

**Electronic equipment (phones, smartwatches, or wearable technology of any kind, laptops, tablet computers, Bluetooth devices, portable listening or recording devices—MP3 player, iPod, etc.—cameras or other photographic equipment, devices that can access the internet, separate timers of any type, and any other electronic or communication devices).**

Books, compasses, correction fluid, dictionaries, highlighters, or notes.

Mechanical pencils, No. 3 pencils, or colored pencils.

Rulers or straightedges (these are allowed only for Physics exams).

Protractors.

Scratch paper (notes can be made on portions of the exam booklets).

Computers or calculators (except as previously noted).

Reference guides, keyboard maps, or other typing instructions.

Watches that beep or have an alarm.

Food or drink.

Clothing or shoes with subject-related information.

Ear plugs.
